We have the entire family back together. Welcome back to Santana. Very excited to have you back and we're going to find out about -- I wrote it down for a good reason. Oscar's trip to Arizona. We have wanted to do this for more time than I can remember. Actually bring a court reporter into the show and today we have very pleased to welcome Mary Ann Payonk and also Dick MARTONE. Robb: What if you say a word

Buzz: We're not used to seeing our
words in understand print.

Robb: She typed it.

Robb: God bless her.

Mike: You say that I am going to
have to share with our listeners may I
MAMBO dog face to the banana patch? So
thanks to Inabnet Reporting and also
Mary Ann and Dick for joining us today.
If we get into an argument, we will have
to read it back and make sure that we
have that on the record.

Robb: Will anything be struck from
the record?

Buzz: Dick says now.

Oscar: Any time I see this kind of
talent you get a little bit of
INTIMIDATED. Kids now type.

Mike: They type all the time.

Oscar: Did you ever have a typing
class growing up?

Mike: I went to typing.

Robb: I had to take it twice.

Mike: Mr. LEVITO.

Robb: Mrs. LEACH was our teacher.

I only got to like 30 words in high school but to go to the upper level of MASCOM in VCU, you had to type like 60 so the only way I could do it was to memorize a balanced hand paragraph. So I didn't have to read the copy I just knew how to type one thing.

Mike: That's cheating.

on? The auctioneer. And I'm just

getting a little bit tired of it.

Robb: What was like the best item that was up for auction?

Mike: There was a cool item with a take you and -- in the old days, I would have been on that myself. It was a ride in a tank where you get to take a tank ride.

Robb: How cool.

Mike: It didn't do anything. That was a cool item. It was a good event. I could not have been better received. I was in the front inside flap of the program with a perfect BIO there. Very, very nicely publicized. It just was the land of suck.

Mike: Here's the thing. The guy that runs the board now I can't tell myself when -- it sounds to me -- hold on a second. When we are recording it sounds like he's right on mic, but also I think that maybe you have a microphone issue because you, my friend, were not audible in that. Not completely inaudible but you were far away.

Robb: Not in the mix?

Mike: Not in the next.

Robb: I will run myself a little

hotter. To my ears when we're doing the
live mix down, it's not something we can
do in post production, to my ears it

sounds right.

Mike: Go back and listen to the Friday one and just tell me what you think because it's just something we will tweak. I've gotten a couple of e-mails about it.

Robb: Mostly from my family.

Mike: People want to hear you more loud and clear.

Robb: I've boosted my gain a little.

Mike: Robb, you are soft-spoken belief it or not. You're not like Mr. BARITONE over there. You're not SHRILL like that.

Buzz: Oscar was really far away from the mic on Friday.

Mike: Note to the people who have an issue with that.

Robb: I apologize to all the people out there.

Oscar: Disregard the e-mails that
end with at ROB.com.

Mike: Back to the auction. Gosh I

go in even though I.

Oscar: Top hat on and all?

Mike: Even though I am the magician, I always go in with a decent attitude. I went into this a little bit on the radio this morning but I'm going to go into it a lot now. 105.9, The Edge.

Robb: Is it like a radio show? Do you work with another guy?

Mike: Yeah, every more than, 5 to 9. I have to ask Mary Ann is this tough because we're flying so fast. Is it tougher than if you're doing medical depositions.

Buzz: We're not supposed to talk directly to her.

Robb: I bet you a quarter she prefers DIMWITTED murderers that talk very slow.

Oscar: She's killing it.

Mike: Joey Inabnet says she's the
best in the business. That's a
complement for you so that's good.

Buzz: Let the record reflect that.

Robb: Are you having a hard time hearing me?

Mike: You're security and here. Are you packing any heat?

Dick: No.

Mike: Very good.

Mike: Did you go through the metal detector before you got here?

Dick: Yes.

Robb: Metal detector.

Dick: The dog checked meal out.

Mike: Four guys going rapid fire is probably tougher than doing a doctors deposition.

Robb: Most doctors are very funny.

Mike: Okay here it is. The auction. So I arrive.

Robb: What time?

Mike: About 5:30.

Robb: This is Sunday.

Mike: They finally give me the
word when the auction will take place,
what time.

Robb: Up to the weekend they were giving you will --

Mike: They said they gave me a time frame and said we're going to do the auction at 8:30.

Buzz: You had been busy with events.

Mike: Right. I have to do it, that's it. No problem it's a nice cause. I won't members the cause and won't mention any names. I will tell you that as I progressed through the evening, the Redskins game was on and there were a bunch of guys walking in and I meet this one guy and he's just a very -- over the top. 3:55 in the morning. Smattering of laughter. The average age is 70. Nobody knows who I am or what I'm doing. You know the questions you get, and we get the same -- question get the questions. People are going, so what is it that you do? I got a BIO in the inside flap of the program that they've already read but they want to say that because that's fun for them because then they can diminish you.

Robb: Their first thought is wonder if he knows Edgar BERGEN.

Mike: Is Diane RHEME.

Oscar: Everybody thinks of oh, my God that guy's so lucky but he must be so poor because he talks out of this little box.

Mike: Zero respect. But I'm sitting at a good table with nice people but I'm already too relaxed. Somehow,

Buzz: They abused you.

Mike: You would have seen it if you were there. I sat down at my table and everybody is going like WOW. I didn't say anything. I took it and I sat down and yes could I have done that? But it's just not --

Buzz: Not the place to do it. You remained the professional.

Mike: I don't care what your politics are but I know the BIO on this guy. I know this Fer is going to donate to George Bush and be a Sarah Palin lover, I know he's going to go to the white church where the moneyed people go. That's the way he is. When I Googled him when I got home, there it all was for everybody to see with his southern name with the last name that's

the first name, you know the crap what

I'm talking about.

Buzz: Sure, yes.

Mike: Montgomery stonewall
confederate III. So I was so done.
Carla was great.

Buzz: Glad glad she was there.

Oscar: The professional
auctioneers. Everybody has heard of a
high line automobile auction in
Scottsdale, Arizona. The one I was at,
rusty Wallace was auctioning off one of
his pace cars. It gets up to like 130
grand, no big deal but that's a lot of
money for what's going for pace cars, I
assume.

Mike: Right.

Buzz: There's a lackey for that.

Buzz: I'm okay with that.

Robb: So Carla was your assistant.
